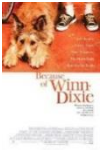

REALISTIC FICTION



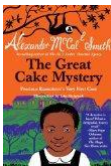
Because of Winn-Dixie, Kate DiCamillo

MYSTERY

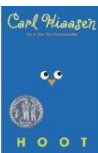


The Great Cake Mystery, Alexander McCall Smith

This is the story of an African girl who says just that. Her name is Precious.

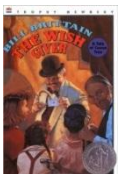

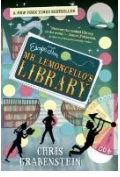


Crenshaw, Katherine Applegate

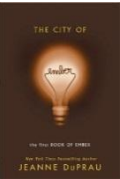

***Escape from Mr. Lemoncello's Library*, Chris Grabenstein**

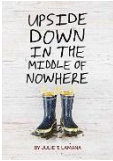

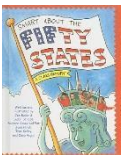
NON-FICTION
